TOURNAMENT OVERVIEW

Neil James "Jim" Willerson won the most recent championship-level event at the 2012 World Series of Poker. The 36-year-old attorney from San Antonio, Texas won the \$1,500 buy-in No-Limit Hold'em tournament, classified as Event #53.

Willerson not only received the game's most coveted prize – the gold bracelet – but a whopping \$737,248 in prize money as well.

Willerson is used to competing -- and winning. He was the 1994 Texas State singles champion in tennis. He also played tennis while in college, where he attended Southern Methodist University and lettered for three-straight years.

However, this victory was a bit more profitable. The three-day competition drew another monster-sized field. The tournament began with 3,166 entrants on Saturday at noon, and concluded on a late Tuesday afternoon at the Rio in Las Vegas. In fact, the field size was so large and the final table play went so long that an unscheduled fourth day was added.

The runner-up was Vladimir Mefodichev, from Moscow, Russia. He had a shot to becoming the first Russian to win a gold bracelet this year. When heads-up play began, Mefodichev enjoyed about a 3 to 1 chip lead and it appeared he was going to join the likes of fellow countrymen Konstantin Puchkov, Alex Kravchenko and other Russians who have won poker's supreme achievement. But the Willerson played an extraordinary heads-up match and earned the biggest victory of his poker career.

INTERVIEW WITH THE WINNER

Question: Lets back up to day one. You were up against more than 3,000 poker players. Is your goal on day one to make the money? Or, are you thinking -- I'm going to win it? What are you thinking going into a huge tourney like this? **Willerson:** Just try to put yourself into position. Just try to get some kind of a decent stack to where you at least have an opportunity to make a final table or something like that. Just try to get as many chips as I can.

Question: You just won like \$700,000, a ridiculous amount of money for most people. Is it Life changing in some ways? **Willerson:** I think so. I mean, its way more than I have ever won before. I don't know yet what I'm going to do with it or anything yet.

Question: What was your biggest poker win before this? **Willerson:** This year same type of event -- I won \$30,000.

Question: What about the importance of the gold bracelet to you? What does that mean?

Willerson: Well this is my goal. I wanted to win at least one bracelet and I wanted to make a deep run in the Main Event. Those were the two goals that I really wanted to do in poker. I don't know if I ever really believed that I would win -- especially in a field of over 3,000 like that.

Question: You're an attorney. What kind of law do you practice?

Willerson: I have a general practice. I use to work for the district attorney's office in San Antonio, Texas. Then, I went into private practice. I do a combination of things. I just have a practice office with two other lawyers and they have been texting me like crazy while I've been here.

Question: Let's fast forward to heads up play.

Willerson: I wanted to try and finish it last night. It wasn't because I felt like I had some advantage one way or the other. When I came out today, he came out really aggressive and he won the first five or six hands. I didn't have anything to really play with and fight back with. I kind of wanted to wait for a decent hand or an opportunity to get involved. I was like, 'come on let's get a little better here,' because it's a little embarrassing when someone wins the first several hands in a row against you. It looks bad at first.

Question: How many events have you played this year? **Willerson:** I think a total of eight. I'm two for eight basically.

Question: How many years have you attended the World Series of Poker?

Willerson: Last year was the first year I came and really played the tournaments. I cashed a few times last year. The year before I just came and played the Main Event. This will be the third year that I'm playing in the Main Event.

ODDS AND ENDS

This is the 1,012th gold bracelet to be awarded in WSOP history. It is also the 1,006th WSOP event in history.

This was classified as WSOP schedule Event #53, since it's the 53rd gold bracelet of 61 to be awarded this summer in Las Vegas.

The final table included only one former gold bracelet winner – Ryan Hughes (2 wins). He finished ninth.

The runner-up was Vladimir Mefodichev, from Korolyov, Russia. He enjoyed the highest finish by a Russian player so far, at this year's WSOP.

The top 324 finishers collected prize money.

The official WSOP gold bracelet ceremony takes place on the day following the winner's victory (or some hours later when the tournament end very late). The ceremony takes place inside Brasilia. The ceremony begins at the conclusion of the first break of the noon tournament. The ceremony usually starts around 2:20 p.m. The national anthem of the winner's nation is played. The entire presentation is open to public and media. Video and photography is permitted by both public and members of the media.
