

CAUFMAN TALLEY WINS SEASON'S FIRST RE-ENTRY EVENT

Biloxi, MS (August 13, 2012) — Last year the World Series of Poker (WSOP) began running re-entry events at each of their unique Circuit stops. From a record-breaking 3,001 entrants at Horseshoe Hammond to 1,219 at Choctaw in Durant, OK, the feedback has been tremendous.

The tournaments have become a staple and returned for the 2012-13 WSOP Circuit season presented by Southern Comfort 100 Proof.

The year's first re-entry event concluded early Monday morning at IP Casino Resort and Spa in Biloxi, MS. The champion was 22-year-old Caufman Talley of Lafayette, LA. Talley is the third champion of the 2012-13 season to hail from Lafayette. The previous two, Blake Barousse and Travis Johnston, are friends of Talley's and never strayed too far from his rail during the crowning performance.

Talley, who started the final table as the chip leader, was awarded \$29,743, 50 points toward the Casino Championship and his second gold ring for first. His first gold ring championship also came at IP Casino Resort and Spa in Biloxi during last year's WSOP Circuit event. He bested 197 entrants in a \$365 No-Limit Hold'em Six-Handed event and was awarded \$14,555 in that showing.

Event #4 was his largest tournament score to date.

This was the fourth of 12 gold ring events on the WSOP Circuit schedule at IP Biloxi. Officially listed as Event #4, the \$365 buy-in No-Limit Hold'em Re-Entry tournament attracted 461 entries. The total prize pool came to \$138,300. The top fifty-four finishers were paid. All players who cashed received WSOP Circuit National Championship ranking points.

The first of the two starting flights began Friday at 12 p.m. local time. The second flight began the same day at 5 p.m. The tournament played out over two consecutive days. Seventy-three players returned Saturday at 12 p.m. for the second and final day of play. It took eight hours and 25 minutes to reach the nine-handed final table (minus a one-hour dinner break).
