23-year-old complements a no-limit hold'em ring with one in Omaha eight.

\$10K bracelet winner Eric Rodawig begins final table with the chip lead, finishes fourth.

Council Bluffs, IA (**April 15, 2014**) — Joshua Reichard earned his second gold ring Tuesday night at Horseshoe Casino in Council Bluffs. The victory came in Event 6, a \$365 Omaha eight or better tournament, and complements the ring he won earlier this season in a Harrah's Rincon no-limit hold'em event.

"It feels good to have two rings in two different games," the Circuit's newest winner said.

Making the victory even more special is the fact it came at the hands of a final table that included \$10,000 stud eight gold bracelet champion Eric Rodawig and Harrah's New Orleans Main Event winner Justin Truesdell. Rodawig came to the final table with the chip lead and, like Reichard, was looking to complement a previously earned gold trophy. The early stages of the finale didn't treat him well though, and he headed to dinner fourth of the four remaining players and holding just three big bets. Unfortunately, he would bust just a few hands back from break.

The fourth-place finish marked Rodawig's third WSOP-related cash since his 2011 victory at the Series. He was preceded on the rail by Truesdell in fifth.

"It feels great to be with the likes of those players and come out on top," a humbled Reichard said following his win.

Reichard's WSOP resume may not include the bracelet of Rodawig's or the six-figures in earnings of Truesdell's, but he's getting there. At only 23 years old Reichard has already recorded 14 Circuit cashes amassing five final tables, more than \$90,000 in earnings, and of course, two rings.

The young attributes much of his success to the support he receives from his wife of seven years and the companionship his father and travel buddy provide on the road.

"She's great. I appreciate her for her support," he said of his wife. "It's the same with my dad and the rest of my family."
