Larry Hirons Wins First WSOP Circuit Ring

Steve Grant Denied Ring #2

New Orleans, LA (**May 10, 2014**) -- "It feels almost as good as if Gary Loveman would have lunch with me -- and if he comes to Dallas, I'll buy him lunch," Larry Hirons said about winning his first ring. (Gary Loveman is the CEO of Caesar's Entertainment.) Along with the WSOP Circuit ring, Hirons collected \$22,909 in first-place prize money.

Hirons is a businessman from the Dallas/Ft. Worth area and started out playing "years ago" in underground games there, "where he met some really, really neat people". He says "I'd rather wear out the bottoms of my shoes than the bottom of my pants" so playing for so many hours "tries my patience". But he "enjoys the challenge".

He was second in chips when they began Day 2 with ten players remaining and he stayed in the chip lead or close to it for most of the day -- until he got heads-up with Syed Alvi. Alvi had him about 2:1 in chips when their match began, but Hirons caught a huge double-up when his A6 made a straight to crack pocket Queens. On the final hand, it all came down to the kicker and 'Easy Larry' Hirons had the bigger one. Alvi pocketed \$14,162 for second place.

The only ring owner at this final table was Steve Grant, who was the chip leader at the start of Day 2. He won his ring here in 2010 and came close to repeating the feat. Grant lost a coin-flip to Syed Alvi and busted out in 3rd place.

The second ring event of the New Orleans series drew 332 players for a total prize pool of \$99,600. The money was spread among the final 36 players. Erica Sumner was the last woman in the event and she bubbled the unofficial final table, busting out in 11th place for \$1,742.

Other notables in the money were ring-bearer Tim West, who finished 21st (\$1,001) and circuit grinder Jamie Kerstetter, who finished 22nd (\$855). Both of these players picked up 5 points on the National Leaderboard, moving up to 59th and 53rd places, respectively. They're both within striking distance of those coveted 50 at-large seats in the National Championship. Also in the money was ring winner Katherine Bowen, who finished 34th (\$515).
